From the Desk of Mayor Bob Iden

Since Stratford Square opened in 1981, the Village of Bloomingdale has enjoyed ample sales tax revenues which have enabled us to maintain high levels of service, while imposing a very low Village property tax. Unfortunately, our sales tax revenues, as well as other revenues have been declining over the past two years. In addition to this, the Governor is proposing to decrease the amount of income tax revenue municipalities would receive, and mandates created by the State are increasing our costs, especially for pensions. Collectively, we need to get pension reform passed at the State level.

In response to the lack of revenues, the Village has been actively reducing its costs, while striving to keep the level of services high. A few of the steps we have taken include:

- Reduced employee count through a voluntary program, and through attrition
- Deferred and reduced road repairs and resurfacing
- Deferred and reduced various maintenance projects
- Deferred purchase of various equipment for Public Works
- Suspended Family Fest for 2010
- Reduced Police Squad replacement costs by keeping vehicles longer

Despite the cost cutting measures we are implementing, it has become necessary to create a new and additional revenue source in order to maintain the critical services the Village provides. The source of this new revenue is a Municipal Telecommunications Tax (MTT), which is a tax on telephone, both cell and land lines, and other charges (such as DSL internet charges) billed to both business and residential customers. At this time, we are the only municipality in DuPage County that does not impose this tax.

The Village estimates that a 5% tax would generate roughly \$1.5 million per year in additional revenue for the Village. Action on this was taken at the March 15th Village Board meeting, and the tax will become effective on July 1, 2010. The Village will continue in its efforts to reduce costs even further in the upcoming months, and regrets the need to impose this tax. We might note that, unlike Bloomingdale, many other area communities have taxes in place on electricity, gas, vehicle stickers, real estate transfers and higher property taxes.



Frank Giammarese Tapped as Bloomingdale's New Police Chief

Our new "Top Cop" is **Frank Giammarese**. Mayor Bob Iden swore Frank in as Bloomingdale's new Police Chief on February 22nd before a packed house of colleagues and supporters. Beginning as a patrol officer in 1988, Frank has worked his way up the ranks of the Bloomingdale Police Department through 22 years of thoughtful and committed service to the Village.

Growing up, Frank wanted to be either a baseball player or a policeman. He was actually recruited to play baseball at a junior college in Iowa. After two years, he figured he'd better start thinking about his future so he began his third year of college going into criminal justice. He was still in school when Bloomingdale called him in 1988. He is proud of the fact that he went on to finish his bachelor's degree at Lewis University while he was working.

He spent seven years of his career in our detective division, as well as representing Bloomingdale on the DuPage Major Crimes Task Force for nine years. Frank is known as a "people" person who can get things done and will work as hard as it takes in order to accomplish the job.

The young man entered law enforcement at Bloomingdale hoping to be able to earn a leadership role here. He admits he never expected to be sitting in the chief's seat. He noted, "I have a lot to be thankful for."

Following his swearing in, Frank expressed his heartfelt gratitude and noted that his top priority will be continuing to give residents the same services they've come to expect.

Bloomingtondale Police Chief Tim Goergen Retires

Congratulations are in order for Bloomingtondale Police Chief Tim Goergen who recently retired from his position and moved on to new opportunities in private practice as a training consultant. Tim was appointed as a police officer on April 10, 1980 joining the force in the midst of Bloomingtondale's surge in growth and population. His professionalism and abilities were recognized early on, and in less than two years, Tim was moved into the Detective Division.

Over the past 29 plus years, Tim distinguished himself as a Police Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Watch Commander, Division Commander, and finally as Police Chief, demonstrating his commitment to serving the Village of Bloomingtondale and its residents with honor.

The 52-year old also shared his proficiency as a teacher/trainer, providing classes for fellow employees in such areas as communication, teamwork, personal security and officer safety, as well as the BASSET training for liquor license holders

Bloomingtondale was especially proud when the Department of Justice requested Tim Goergen's assistance in Iraq, where he completed two training assignments toward the establishment of its new police academy.

According to Mayor Iden, "Tim had a vision when he accepted the position of Police Chief and through his leadership, took a department that already had a great reputation in the law enforcement community, and made it even greater. We wish him all the best."

New Parking Fines Effective on April 1

For the past several years, the Village of Bloomingtondale and the Police Department have resisted increasing our parking fines. However, at this time the Village of Bloomingtondale has chosen to increase the amount of the parking fines to partially recover some of costs for police service, and to be more aligned with the fine amounts being imposed in the surrounding area jurisdictions.

The increase is also viewed to be a possible deterrent for those people choosing to repeatedly violate the parking laws of the Village.

These rates become effective April 1st, 2010.

Extreme Weather Tornado Sirens

The Village installed four Extreme Weather/Tornado sirens in and around the Village to alert citizens who may be outdoors when a tornado warning is issued. The sirens are not intended to alert people indoors. It is highly recommended that each residence, business, school and church purchase weather alert radios that are automatically activated during severe weather occurrences. The Extreme Weather/Tornado sirens are activated when severe weather or a tornado is in the area. When sirens are activated they sound continuously for 3 minutes. Please take shelter immediately in the lowest floor of your home. If you do not have a basement, take shelter in an interior room away from windows for the most protection.

NO all clear signal or sound is activated when the warning has been canceled or expired. Please monitor local radio or TV for weather updates during severe weather or if you hear the siren activated. Please DO NOT call 9-1-1 when you hear these sirens.

Test of the system is conducted the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m. At that time the siren is sounded for 1 minute. The monthly tests are conducted to test the operation of the sirens and to familiarize the citizens with the sound of the siren should extreme weather/tornados be in our area. The system also allows an "attack" mode. This is a wavering sound and is only used for Homeland Security warnings.

Village's Spring Branch Collection Program Begins April 19

Kramer Tree Specialists, Inc. will once again perform branch collection under the direction of the Village Forestry Division. Branch collection will begin on Monday, April 19. The program is only available to single family detached residences. Townhome residents should contact their association regarding branch collection.

Branch Collection Guidelines:

- Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, April 19.
- Branches should not be placed at the curb/pavement edge any earlier than one week prior to the scheduled collection date.
- Woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter are the only items that will be picked up. (Note: any spikes, hooks or other metal objects must be removed).
- Long lengths are favored provided branches do not block sidewalks and pedestrian access.
- All branches should be placed at the curb or pavement edge and stacked in an orderly fashion with the cut or larger end towards the pavement.
- Thorny tree branches should not be concealed inside piles. These require special care as to not cause injuries to the workers.

The following items are unacceptable:

- Branches left out in a tangled mess.
- Woody branches under ½ inch in diameter.
- Leaves, vines, small (under ½ inch in diameter) flexible willow stems, herbaceous plants and weeds.
- Large stumps, roots and root balls.*
- Wooden fencing and construction lumber.*

The above items are considered yard waste and may be placed in bags or cans with tags for pick-up by Republic (formerly Allied Waste). Yard waste pick-ups commence April 1st and continue through Republic pick-ups should be directed to 847-981-0091.

*Large stumps, roots and root balls are considered trash and do not require a yard waste tag, provided each item is of manageable size and under 50 pounds.

Wooden fencing and construction lumber are also considered trash, but require a special pick-up. Contact Republic at the above number for more information.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

Your cooperation is greatly appreciated and will ensure a successful program.

Census Questionnaires are in the Mail

A reminder about completing the Census 2010 questionnaires - It is important for all Bloomingdale residents to participate in the 2010 Census. The head of your household should complete the questionnaire answering the 10 questions for every person living in the household, even if any of them are not yet a citizen, an extended family member or a non-relative. Every resident counted means \$1,400 annually in federal revenue support to the DuPage County region. All completed Census questionnaires are to be returned by mail on or about April 1st, the official Census Day. Census workers will visit homes that did not return questionnaires to secure the information requested.

The U.S. Census Bureau has issued a public security alert to help the public recognize fraudulent activity or unofficial data collections. Please note, the Census Bureau will never:

- Contact you via the Internet
- Ask for your full social security number
- Ask for money or donations
- Send requests on behalf of a political party
- Request PIN codes, passwords or similar access information for credit cards, bank or other financial accounts

Con and Scam Alert: Local Residents Being Victimized Through ‘Ruse Entry Burglaries’

Some unscrupulous people spend most of their time inventing ways to trick people out of their money, particularly preying on senior citizens. By reading the daily newspaper or watching the evening news, you can see/hear the stories about con artists working different scams. Usually, the stories that raise our awareness come from someone else’s misfortune.

Recently Bloomingdale and Elk Grove Village have been investigating incidents of a Ruse Entry Burglary. Seniors have been victimized by a group of men who use a ruse to enter their homes, in order to locate and steal cash, jewelry and other valuables. The suspects involved in these cases gained entry to the elderly victims’ residences by claiming to be working with the Village regarding water repair work (roofing or driveway repair services are common as well). During the incidents, an individual would keep the victim occupied in conversation inside the home or lure the victim outside, while other individuals would enter the residence and look for valuables. The reports have indicated that two male suspects may have been involved in these cases. The reports also describe the suspect vehicles to have been a white sport utility vehicle or a mini-van.

The Bloomingdale Police Department wants all citizens to be aware of home repair fraud, phone scams, mail fraud, and to practice the following safety tips.

- Keep doors and windows locked at all times.
- Never open the doors to strangers. Ask service people for identification and call the company for further verification.
- If you see ANY suspicious people or activity, contact the local police department **immediately**.
- Check with family, friends or the Village Building Department/Police Department for validity of a business.
- Don’t give personal or financial information over the phone.
- Hang up on nuisance callers and report them.
- Consult with trusted individuals regarding any business / financial affairs.

Senior citizens are not always the victims in these cases, but they are generally targeted. In order to reduce victimization, please be alert and aware of your surroundings, utilize good safety practices, and keep in contact with your neighbors and your local police department. Being “the eyes and ears of the community” will help reduce victimization for you and others.

Summer 2010 Road Construction

Pavement Reconstruction

Reconstruction of Duxbury Court - includes removal and replacement of the existing asphalt pavement and the addition of concrete curbs and gutters. The new roadway will be the same width as the existing road; no widening is planned.

Reconstruction of Bridgewater Lane, Surrey Lane and Surrey Drive – includes the removal and replacement of all concrete curb and gutter, driveway aprons, and 2.5” of the existing asphalt pavement.

As part of the work, the Village will be installing a depressed curb at each driveway. This means the “bump” at the curb of each driveway will be eliminated, and a smooth transition from the street to each driveway will be constructed.

This work will begin mid-May and will take approximately 2 ½ months to complete. During construction, this road will be closed to through traffic. If you live in the construction zone you will be permitted to proceed past the barricades to reach your residence.

Pavement Overlay

Overlay maintenance consists of pavement patching, curb and gutter repairs to correct drainage deficiencies, storm sewer repairs and a new asphalt road surface. The following streets will receive pavement overlay:

This work will begin mid-May and will take approximately 2 ½ months to complete. Local detour signage consisting of “Road Construction Ahead” signs will be posted prior to construction.

Schick Road Resurfacing

Schick Road Resurfacing will take place on Schick Road between Lorraine Circle and Gary Avenue. This work will include removal and replacement of the existing concrete curb followed by a 3” overlay of new asphalt over the existing concrete roadway.

This work is scheduled to begin in the beginning of May or when suitable weather permits and take approximately 3 months to complete. Motorists are advised to use alternate routes around the construction zone to avoid delays.

Dump No Waste

The Storm Water collection system is completely separate from our Sanitary Sewer collection system. Although they both transport flows, their treatment and destinations are distinctively different.

The sanitary sewers flow to the Village's Water Reclamation Facility, where it is treated and then discharged into the East Branch of the DuPage River. Storm Water, however, flows directly into one of three tributary receiving streams - the East Branch DuPage River, the West Branch DuPage River, or Springbrook Tributary to Salt Creek, without any pre-treatment.

Anything dumped into a storm water inlet will eventually discharge into a natural waterway, endangering our environment. Village Ordinance 92-31 strictly prohibits anything other than storm run-off to be discharged, dumped, placed or deposited into the storm water system. This includes garbage, debris, landscape waste, leaves, or flammable or toxic substances in liquid, gas or solid forms such as motor oil, gasoline, paint, paint cleaners and cleaning solvents. Fines in the amount of \$50 to \$500 can be levied per occurrence. Violators may be responsible for clean-up costs, which are typically thousands of dollars.

If you see anyone dumping anything into a storm water inlet, please call the Bloomingdale Police Department non-emergency at 630-529-9868, or the Village Services Utilities Division at 630-671-5830.

Pollutants that wash down storm drains go directly to the river. Storm water run-off is now one of the leading causes of surface water pollution in DuPage County according to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. For this reason, storm drains are stenciled with the message "DUMP NO WASTE - DRAINS TO RIVER".

Keeping these stencils legible is an on-going project as the lettering erodes away. Anyone is welcome to participate in the effort - families, homeowner associations, school groups, scouting groups and service organizations. To schedule a "stenciling" event contact our Village Services Utilities Division at (630) 671-5830. Please bring the following with you for your stenciling event: wear old clothes and shoes, whisk broom and/or wire brush to clean the surface to be stenciled, sheet of cardboard (broken down box) to guard against drifting paint, old rags and bags for cleaning up materials. 



Emerald Ash Borers Have Arrived in Bloomingdale



The Illinois Department of Agriculture has confirmed the presence of the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) in parkway trees in Bloomingdale along Springfield Drive between Army Trail Road and Butterfield Drive. Bloomingdale Forestry staff is now inspecting, and will continue to monitor the surrounding area to

determine the extent of the EAB infestation. The EAB is a small, metallic green insect. Because no fully effective insecticidal eradication treatment exists, the EAB poses a significant threat to the urban forest of Illinois. Locally the EAB has been detected in Addison, east of Bloomingdale, unincorporated areas of Bloomingdale Township to the southeast and unincorporated Glendale Heights to the south.

It is important for property owners including residents, homeowner associations, businesses, and other public entities to become educated, aware, and vigilant inspecting their ash trees for signs of infestation. An EAB infestation kills Ash trees relatively quickly. The EAB deposits eggs on the surface or cracks of the ash tree bark, which hatch to release larvae that feed on the tree's phloem and outer sapwood. Within several weeks larval feeding creates S-shaped galleries in the tree's inner bark that wind back and forth, becoming progressively wider and girdling the trunk and branches as larvae grow.

Village Forestry staff is available to confirm suspected infestation of (EAB). If you suspect that you have found an adult or larval form of this insect, freeze the insect and bring it to the Village of Bloomingdale's Public Works Facility, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, or contact the Public Works - Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 or the Illinois Department of Agriculture toll-free hotline 1-800-641-3934.

At the time of this writing, the Village is finalizing the details of its response plan for both the affected Village owned 'public' tree inventory and affected trees on 'private' property which will be released when completed. Watch our website www.villageofbloomingdale.org for information on that plan, as well as guidelines for residents.

Spring Safety Checklist for Warm Weather Activities

The Bloomington Fire Protection District and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention would like you and your children to stay safe this spring. In order to help, we would like to provide you with the following statistics and safety information:

Bike and Pedestrian Safety

In 2005, 18 children ages 14 and under died in bicycle-related incidents, and more than 236,000 were injured in 2007. Head injury is the leading cause of death in bicycle crashes. A collision with a motor vehicle causes nearly 90 percent of bicycle-related deaths. One hundred seventy-nine children ages 14 and under died in 2005 from pedestrian injuries. Nearly 27,500 children received emergency room treatment for pedestrian injuries in 2007.

Many head injuries can be prevented with safe play rules. Here are some basic safety tips to keep children safe:

- Children under 10 should ride on sidewalks or safe areas only like a bike path. Teens may ride in the street, riding with traffic, after they learn the rules of the road.
- Require children (and adults) to wear a helmet every time you ride a bike, scooter, skateboard, in-line skate, ice skate, snow board or ski.
- Make sure children ride bikes in safe areas and never at night.
- Teach children to always come to a complete stop before entering a driveway, path or sidewalk. Look left, right, and left again for other bikes, cars, or pedestrians.
- Encourage children to use the proper hand signals when turning to let drivers know their intent.
- Children should walk, not ride a bike across the street, and cross only with a grown-up.
- Children under 10 should never cross a street alone.
- Grown-ups and older children should be role models and set a positive example by practicing safe street-crossing rules.
- Teach children how to cross the street. Stop at the curb or edge of the road and look left then right, then left again for moving cars. Wait until the street is clear; keep looking left and right until you have safely crossed the street.
- Never allow children to play in a driveway or parking lot.

Falls Prevention

Unintentional falls are the leading cause of nonfatal injuries among children. More than 2.1 million children 14 and under were treated in hospital emergency rooms for fall-related injuries in 2007. Eighty-two children ages 14 and under died from falls in 2005. Lack of supervision is associated with 40% of playground injuries.

Many fall injuries can be prevented with safe play rules. Here are some basic safety tips to keep children safe:

At Play

- Inspect playground equipment to make sure it is age appropriate and in good condition.
- Play areas should be covered with at least 12 inches of shredded mulch, wood chips, pea gravel, and fine sand or covered with rubber or rubber-like material designed for use under playground materials. Dirt, grass and sand do not provide proper fall protection.
- Encourage children to take turns on playground equipment.
- Encourage children to play gently –pushing and roughhousing can lead to falls.
- Never allow children to wear jackets with drawstrings, jewelry, or scarves around the neck. They can get caught on playground equipment.

In the Home

- Keep stairs clear of toys and other items that could cause someone to trip. Teach children to hold the handrail when on stairs or escalators and always tie their shoelaces to avoid tripping over them.
- Windows opened as little as five inches pose a danger to children under 10. Install window guards with quick release mechanisms that can be opened easily from the inside in case there is a fire.
- Make sure tall furniture, clocks, televisions, etc. are secured to the wall to prevent falling on children.



This offer does not apply to lost or damaged items, fees and fines due to another library, or associated collection and processing fees. All items collected will be given to the Bloomingdale Township Food Pantry, which will distribute it to the needy.

*Acceptable non-perishable food items include but are not limited to:

- Canned foods, like veggies, fruit, beans, meat and fish, peanut butter, pasta sauces, ready-to-eat foods like ravioli
- Dry beans, rice, pasta
- Macaroni and cheese and other packaged dinners
- Cereal and crackers



**Acceptable personal health and hygiene items include but are not limited to:

- Formula, wipes, and other infant care items
- Deodorants, lotions
- Toothpaste, toothbrushes, floss
- Feminine products



Please do not bring: items that are past the expiration date; dented, corroded, ripped, open, or otherwise damaged packaging; prescription medications; or home-canned goods.

(If you prefer to make a monetary contribution to the food bank, you can send them a check or gift card. Additionally, the Township of Bloomingdale welcomes gift cards in small increments to Butera, Aldi, and Caputo's food stores; however, monetary or gift contributions will not count against library fines.)
