Bob Iden was honored at the May 13 Village Board meeting for his 34 years of commitment to the Village of Bloomingdale, and most notably his 20 years of service as Bloomingdale's Village President. The newly seated Village Board adopted Resolution No. 2013-R-18, noting the many achievements of Bob's administration, as well as highlighting the milestones marked during his tenure.

Bob's strong commitment to quality of life initiatives, a strong tax base, positive

intergovernmental relations, the passage of the home rule referendum enabling the Village to preserve the Glendale Golf Course as open space (admittedly, his proudest achievement), his enthusiasm for our many community service organizations, as well as his leadership on various governmental and intergovernmental boards and commissions – all of these contributed to a distinguished 20-year career at Bloomingdale's helm.

Bob thanked the Village for the honor of serving as Village President. He said he and his wife JoEllen moved here because they loved what they saw here in 1968. Some 45 years later, he loves what Bloomingdale has become and can't think of anywhere else he would rather live.

Trustee Jim Gebis was also honored with Resolution No. 2013-R-19 for his total commitment of 31 years to the Village of Bloomingdale, first as a Plan Commission member, then 24 years as Village Trustee. His enthusiasm for the development of the Village through careful planning, as well as his commitment to environmental concerns, such as the undergrounding of utilities, the formation of a citizen Traffic Concerns Committee and the creation & maintenance of recreational pathways made him a great asset to the Village.


## Holiday Changes to Garbage Pickup Schedule


## Summer Branch Collection Begins July 15



The Summer Branch Collection will be performed under the direction of the Village Forestry Division beginning on Monday, July 15. This free service is only available to single family detached residences. Branches must be out by 7:00 AM on Monday, July 15, but should not be placed at the curb/pavement edge more than one week earlier. In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter. Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671-5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.

"It sounded like a freight train," is often the description used by people who have experienced the terror of a tornado. Spring and summer thunderstorms usually are the catalyst from which tornadoes spring. Because of the frequency of warm weather thunderstorms, it is wise to be prepared to seek shelter anytime a severe thunderstorm arises. Severe thunderstorms are usually accompanied by heavy rain, high winds and hail. Depending on the severity of a thunderstorm, the National Weather Service may issue either a **tornado watch** or a **tornado warning**.



A **tornado watch** means that tornadoes may occur in or near the area. You should listen to the local radio and TV for information and instructions. If you have a line of site to the southwest, be alert for funnel-shaped clouds. If you should spot one, seek shelter immediately and contact 9-1-1.

A **tornado warning** means a tornado has been spotted or indicated by weather radar. Take shelter immediately, turn on a battery-operated radio and wait for the "all clear" announcement. Should a tornado warning be issued for the immediate Bloomington/Roselle area, the Village's emergency sirens will be sounded. When you hear the siren, do not waste time getting to your shelter.

### REMEMBER:

If you are at your home, go to the lowest level of your home. If you do not have a basement or crawl space, go to an interior closet or hallway. If possible, get under a sturdy table and protect your head.

If at a school, nursing home or like structure, go to pre-designated shelter areas, usually on the lowest floor.

If you are in a car, get out and take shelter in a nearby building, if possible. If there are no structures nearby, try to find a drainage ditch or other low-lying area. Never try to outrun a tornado.

When tornadoes threaten, immediate action can save your life. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls in your home. Cover your head; any debris may become flying missiles.

## Hydrant Flushing Begins June 3

**Reminder:** The Village Services - Utilities Division will be performing the annual Hydrant Flushing Program beginning June 3, 2013 through June 17, 2013. The Program will be performed during the daytime hours of 8:00 am - 3:00 pm. Please **DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY** during the flushing hours, as rust staining of the clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period. ## Watch Your Speed in Construction Zones

As the summer season begins, so does the "Construction Season." Projects along Illinois roadways are projected to continue until November, so drivers need to be prepared during their travels. Please note - Construction speed zones are in effect at all times! Construction workers have various working hours and the special speed limit signs (and penalties) are enforced continually whether or not workers are visible. The penalties begin at \$375.00 and increase depending upon the incident and the driver's record. Most tickets will have an attached court appearance with an additional court fine. If there is not a special construction speed limit sign posted, then the driver is required to adhere to the posted speed limit for the area.



## Curfew Information

**Reminder:** The Village of Bloomingdale enforces a village wide-curfew ordinance that affects all people under the age of seventeen. It is illegal for a person under the age of seventeen to be at any public place without adult supervision between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Sunday night through Friday morning or 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday. Parents may set additional curfew rules for their household.

In addition, the driver's license of any person affected by this curfew law is not valid during the above curfew hours. Any teenager under the age of seventeen found to be driving during curfew hours might be arrested for driving without a valid driver's license. The only exceptions to this law include minors driving directly home from work after the curfew hours and minors who are accompanied by an adult.

## Make It a Safe Summer

While we are taking advantage of the warm weather and enjoying the great outdoors, the Bloomingdale Police Department reminds both parents and children to be aware that the warm weather can also bring out unscrupulous individuals to monitor areas where youngsters gather.

Parents are strongly encouraged to caution both children and young adults to avoid contact with unfamiliar individuals who may ask for directions, attempt to provide gifts / money, or engage in any conversation. "Stranger Danger" talks apply to everyone, no matter what the age or physical size of a person. The Bloomingdale Police Department also requests that the agency be notified as soon as possible should an encounter with a suspicious person and/or vehicle occur. ### Be on the Lookout for Emerald Ash Borer

EAB was first confirmed in Bloomingdale in the spring of 2010. Village Forestry staff is seeing increased EAB numbers and continues to monitor the extent of the infestation.

It is important for residents to become educated, aware and vigilant, inspecting their ash trees for signs of infestation. Signs and symptoms include:

- ✓ Canopy dieback – thinning of the canopy throughout, which may start from the tips of the tree; initial stages may be difficult to see from the ground
- ✓ Sprouts growing from roots and trunk
- ✓ Splitting bark
- ✓ Serpentine galleries viewed if bark is removed
- ✓ Very small D-shaped exit holes which are difficult to see
- ✓ Increased woodpecker activity/damage; woodpeckers feed on EAB larvae located under the bark, and may leave jagged holes in the bark

## Skeeter Season


When you are outdoors, use insect repellent containing an EPA-registered active ingredient. Follow the directions on the package.

In the 1950s Leonard Grimsley opened his own hardware store in Addison, calling it Len's Best Hardware. In the 70s his son, Len, took over the business. After the third generation of Lens joined the company upon his graduation from college, two more stores were added - Roselle in 1997 and Glen Ellyn in 2000. Soon Bloomington residents shopping at the Addison store, inquired about a Bloomington location.

Len (the 3rd) now the CEO, decided to build here and in 2005 opened the Bloomington Len's Ace Hardware. The architecturally distinctive brick building works very well in the unusual configuration at the corner of Lake Street and Springfield Drive and provides an appealing northwestern gateway to the Village.

The "Len's Ace Hardware" approach to the business is personal service, supplying the customer with the product to fulfill their immediate needs. An example of this is now including chip keys and key fobs to the key cutting service. Len's is a full service hardware store offering professional help in all fields of home repair and decorating. In the spring, there is a flower and garden sales area outside. Mulch, bark, sand and gravel are available year round, as is bulk firewood. Len's also recently expanded its bird feeding supplies department.

In keeping with the tradition of filling a variety of needs, Len's also services any make of small engine equipment, repairs items from snow blowers and lawn mowers to broken screens and windows, replaces propane tanks and sharpens tools and blades. The store also carries gas and charcoal grills, specializing in Weber products and assembly is free.

Like any other business in this tough economy, things have slowed down a bit, but Len's has been able to expand services. The store employs 20-25 people here in town; staff has not been reduced.

A well maintained store, the products and services you need, helpful, knowledgeable employees and a tradition of personal attention that has lasted three generations -- all good reasons to shop at Len's Ace Hardware, right here in town.



## Family Disaster Plan: Have one in place as you wait for help to arrive

In light of the recent flooding, the Bloomingtondale Fire Protection District and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) would like to remind you that in a disaster, local officials and relief workers cannot reach everyone immediately. Help may not arrive for hours or days. You and your family -- and don't forget to include the needs of those with disabilities -- need to be prepared ahead of time because you won't have time to shop or search for the supplies you will need when a disaster strikes.

Most disasters are natural disasters, the result of some force of nature, such as tornadoes, hurricanes, and floods. Some natural disasters can be predicted, such as hurricanes and severe winter storms, while others, such as tornadoes and earthquakes, happen with little or no warning.

Some disasters are the cause of human actions, intentional or unintentional. A disaster plan will help with safety, security, and comfort.

Regardless of the type of disaster, there are things you can do to prepare. Contact your local Red Cross chapter, visit the FEMA Web site, or Ready.gov to make sure you are aware of the potential for natural disasters in your community. After you have identified the types of disasters that could strike where you live, create a family disaster plan that can apply to any type of disaster – natural, unintentional, or intentional.

### Prepare an emergency supplies kit

Disaster can occur suddenly and without warning. They can be frightening for adults, but they are traumatic for children if they don't know what to do when these events occur. Children depend on daily routines. When an emergency disturbs their routine, children can become nervous. In an emergency, they'll look to parents or other adults to help.

How parents react to an emergency gives children an indication on how to act. They see their parents' fear as proof that the danger is real. A parent's response during this time may have a long-term impact. Including children in the family's recovery plans will help them feel that their life will return to normal.

Families should prepare an emergency supplies kit and develop a plan. Practice your plan so that everyone will remember what to do in an emergency. Everyone in the home, including children, should play a part in the family's response and recovery efforts. Remember: make the plan simple so everyone can remember the details.

- Discuss what to do in an evacuation. When told by officials, go immediately to a shelter as instructed or to the home of a friend or relative who lives out of the area. Find out about your local shelters beforehand.
- Know evacuation routes. Pre-establish several different routes in case certain roads are blocked or closed.
- Family members can become separated during an emergency. Be prepared by creating a plan for how to reach one another. Establish an out-of-area contact (such as a relative or friend) who can coordinate family members' locations and information should you become separated. Make sure children learn the phone numbers and addresses, and know the emergency plans.



## Rules of the Road Reminders
