Salting Operations for Winter 2017

After the extremely mild weather we've enjoyed this fall, it's hard to start thinking about snow and ice. But Midwestern reality will surely set in soon, so here are some reminders about the salting procedures. **Keep in mind, in all areas each storm will dictate the amount of material placed down.**

Main Village Roads . . . (Brighton Drive, Butterfield Drive, Byron Avenue, Camden Drive, Cardinal Drive, N. Circle Avenue, Covington Drive, Edgewater Drive, Euclid Avenue, Fairfield Way, Fox Court, Glen Ellyn Road, Greenway Drive, Knollwood Drive, Madsen Drive, Schick Road, Scott Drive, Springfield Drive) will be treated using salt dosed with liquid calcium chloride.

Just for clarification – Lake Street is State owned, Bloomingdale Road, Army Trail,



Members of the Snow and Ice Team have been waiting for the balmy November weather to give way to winter. The crew is ready to fight the elements to keep our streets clean and safe.

Medinah Road and Gary Avenue are DuPage County roads. Snow and ice control for these roadways are carried out by these respective agencies.

2016 Winter Salting Operation Intersections . . . will be treated 100 feet adjacent to each intersection using salt dosed with liquid calcium chloride.

Hills and Curves . . . will be treated 50 feet adjacent to hazardous areas using salt dosed with

liquid calcium chloride.

All Other Village Streets and Cul-De-Sacs . . . will be either untreated or spot salted when conditions dictate using salt dosed with liquid calcium chloride.

It should be noted that the above policies will serve as a general guideline. The policy may require adjustments after establishing weather and pavement conditions, as well as other factors in the interest of motorist safety.

A Message from Mayor Franco

It's hard to believe another year will soon be coming to a close. The holiday season is upon us, but before we look at family activities and new traditions, I'd like to take a minute to reflect on some highlights of Bloomingdale 2016.

The Old Town Farmers' Market debuted in June. Many thanks to all of you who supported our first season. We were pleased with the success of our first venture into this weekly outdoor attraction and the positive response of our community. Conversations with our vendors, both during and at the end of the season, yielded satisfaction, encouragement, and constructive criticism, along with promises to return next season.

Much to the delight of our residents, FIREWORKS returned to Bloomingdale in July after a long absence. This one night of great community spirit and incredible pyrotechnics was the talk of the town for a month!

Two months later, we revealed a reimagined Old Town and hosted one of the best attended Septemberfests in recent memory. The weather was incredible and everyone was smiling from the first step of the parade until the last note played by 7th Heaven.

A quick update of soon to open businesses – Jimador Mexican Restaurant, 156 S. Bloomingdale Road and D's Sweet Treats, on Third Street (in Old Town) are both planning December openings. Plus Mariano's is targeting a January 2017 debut. In fact, 2017 will see more openings in its first quarter of the year.

And now (drum roll, please), if you thought last year's holiday light show was fantastic, wait until you experience this year! The Village Campus will be even more breathtaking and Old Town will come alive with an expanded Festival of Lights and decorations which will extend north from the park all the way to Lake Street.

The Library's Open House was Tuesday, November 29. Santa arrived and the lights went on all over the Village Hall campus. On Friday, December 2, the Festival of Lights begins at 6:30 p.m. When the switch is thrown, all the lights in Old Town will come on. As part of a new tradition, we will be lighting a live tree placed in the circular planter on the piazza on Franklin Street. The following Spring, the tree will be planted somewhere in the Village to memorialize the season. We will continue this tradition each year.

There are plenty of family holiday activities going on this month. Check out the Festival of Lights calendar on p. 7. And subscribe to our E-news if you haven't already, to learn weekly about other activities in town.

Two more important thoughts: "Keep the Cheer Here" by buying in Bloomingdale when holiday shopping because it builds a stronger local economy and keeps your sales tax dollars in the Village. Detective Steve Abruzzo Promoted to Sergeant



Enjoy Your Live Christmas Tree . . . Then Dispose of It at the Curb

Republic Services, Inc. the Village refuse hauler, will pick up live Christmas trees, up to six-feet tall, at the curb on residents' first four scheduled pick up days in January. Place your Christmas tree at the parkway and follow these simple guidelines:

- Please do not put trees in plastic bags
- Be sure all decorations (and the stand) are removed
- Dispose of natural wreaths with the regular household trash
- Position Christmas trees with the cut end toward the curb for easy loading



Christmas tree pick-up ends on Friday, January 27, 2017.

Yard waste stickers are not required for Christmas tree disposal.

Wintertime Words to the Wise

With the seasonal snowfall just around the corner, the Village Services Department, Public Works Division is ready to combat snow and ice on the 151 miles of Village streets, making them safer for motorists. Village crews are promptly mobilized when a storm begins, day or night.



What Are the Village's Parking Regulations When It Snows?

The Village's winter parking ban takes effect after snowfalls of 2 inches or more. The ban applies to all vehicles on any Village-owned street and is in effect for a period of 24 hours or until the streets have been cleared of snow. Residents can assist Village crews in the snow removal efforts by parking vehicles in driveways or other off-street parking areas.

What if a Snowplow Damages My Parkway?

The Public Works Division understands that there could be some damage to parkways due to snow plowing operations. It is Village policy to repair parkways in April, May, and early June, weather permitting, as this is the best time for the germination of grass seed. Please call the Public Works Division at 630-671-5800 to inform us about damage to your parkway so we can put your location on the list.

Why Does My Driveway Get Plowed In?

The snowplows are designed to direct the snow to the curb side of the plow blade. "Side delivery plows" are the fastest and most efficient means available to remove snowfall from the streets. As a result, snow is discharged along the length of the curb, the parkways and the private driveway areas. The Village has thousands of private driveways abutting Village streets, the cleaning of which is the responsibility of the property owner.

Manpower and equipment limitations prohibit the Village from responding to routine requests to remove snow from private driveways. Therefore, we strongly recommend residents delay clearing the driveway until the snowplows have cleaned the majority of your street. Village ordinance PROHIBITS the discharge of snow onto the Village streets. This illegally placed snow may freeze or become compacted, creating a safety hazard for all motorists.



ComEd Underground Electric Cable Replacement Project

Village of Bloomingdale Offers Expanded Holiday Weekend Hours for Dial-A-Ride Transportation

The Village of Bloomingdale will again be offering Expanded Weekend Dial-A-Ride hours during the holiday season from Saturday, November 26 through Saturday, December 31.

Hours are Saturday, 8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m. and Sunday, 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. There is no Dial-A-Ride service on Thanksgiving Day or Christmas Day.

Bloomingdale residents may ride anywhere within the Bloomingdale Township boundaries and also to Central DuPage, Alexian Brothers and Glen Oaks Hospitals; DuPage Oncology Clinic, Monakea Medical Complex, Wheaton Medical Clinic and Wheaton Eye Clinic.

Bloomingdale's Weekend Dial-A-Ride one-way rates are: \$3.00 for Adult Residents, \$1.50 for Village residents with a disability, Village senior citizens (age 65 & older) and for students. Children (under age 7) when accompanied by a fare-paying adult are free.

Reservations shall be accepted beginning Thursday of the preceding week service is desired, and with as little as one (1) day advance notice. Same day service requests are not guaranteed.

Weekend Dial-A-Ride Reservations may be made by calling 1-800-713-7445.

During November and December of 2016, ComEd, and its sub-contractor Intren, will be replacing old underground electric cable in certain areas of the Village. The project location follows the location of the existing underground electric distribution network, usually in rear yards of properties. The project locations are:

- The east side of North Maple Ave at Lake Street
- Old Town, west of 3rd Street to South Maple Avenue
- Day Street north of Washington Street
- Between Jefferson Street and Constitution Street
- Both sides of Longridge Drive south, within 300 feet of Schick Road
- Harvard Lane, Dover Court, Colony Court and Brentwood Court

The work is part of ComEd's annual system reliability improvements. The majority of the work will be completed by Intren, a sub-contractor to Com-Ed. To minimize disturbance and the scope of restorations, horizontal directional drilling, a steerable trenchless method of installing underground pipes, conduits and cables, will be used to replace the underground cable. Only occasional excavations will be required to complete the work. Minimal, if any, electrical service disruptions are expected in completing the work. Both ComEd and Intren personnel will be working in rear yard and/or side yard easements to complete their various tasks.

Intren will place a door hanger notifying affected property owners in the work area. Both Intren and ComEd workers will be wearing or carrying identification. Both ComEd and Intren vehicles should be also be clearly marked. No workers should ask you for access to the interior of your residence to complete the work, as it is not necessary.

Areas disturbed by the work will be restored with top soil and seed blanket as weather permits; some restoration may need to be finished in the Spring of 2017 depending on the weather. What if a Snowplow Damages My Mailbox?

The Village will replace and/or reimburse a resident up to \$50.00 for a mailbox and post which is damaged as a result of the Village snowplow operations, provided the homeowner notifies the Village of the damage, the Village performs an in-house investigation, and the mailbox is installed per Village setback requirements.

Residents are requested to inspect mailboxes and posts to ensure sturdiness and compliance with the postal service installation requirements, and correct any problem identified. If you have questions as to whether or not your mailbox is in compliance with Village requirements, you may contact the Village Services Department - Street Maintenance Division at 630-671-5800.

New Officer Hired

Dave Wolak was sworn in as Police Officer by Mayor Franco at the August 8, 2016 Village Board Meeting. While he is still in field training with his Bloomingdale police officer instructor, he will be on his own soon.

At the October 24 Village Board meeting, three Police officers were recognized with a commendation for their life saving actions in two separate incidents.

Sergeant Aaron Machek was recognized for properly assessing a heroin overdose situation upon arriving at the scene last June. He administered Narcan, definitely playing a role in saving the life of a young adult in dire need of medical attention.

Officers Raymond Murrell (l) and Dallas Janes (r) were honored for promptly administering an AED and CPR, playing a role in saving the life of a heart-attack victim, until the Fire Protection District personnel arrived on the scene.

Two Police Veterans Retire

Jackie Slater, after 20 years with the Bloomingdale Police Department, retired in September. Most recently, her areas of concentration have been firearms training and emergency management. Jackie holds the distinction of being the first woman sergeant in the history of our department, as well as the first woman watch commander.



Tom Burns also retired in September after nearly 31 years of service to the department. In addition to working as a patrol officer, Tom was an evidence technician for a number of years, and served as a detective from 2005 until his retirement. Moreover, under his leadership for the last 12+ years, Tom took Bloomingdale's Peer Jury to a whole new level.

Shop Online Securely This Holiday Season

As more people shop via the internet for gifts, more vigilance is needed to protect your private information. The following recommendations will be helpful.

Shop securely.

Use a secure virtual private network,

known as a VPN, so cybercriminals cannot track your activity from your mobile device, desktop or laptop. Be wary of free Wi-Fi, because it may reveal your private information. Also, use a so-called disposable e-mail when visiting sites that require e-mail addresses and you don't want to provide your own. Visit www.privacy-mart.com to create your own disposable e-mails.



Watch your transactions: When paying online, make sure the connection is secure by the padlock emblem or the URL with the “https” at the top.

Stop before you share. Find out who is asking you for your information and be careful of any links they provide and ask you to click.

Watch your monthly credit card statements. If there are any unauthorized charges, report it. Also, check your annual credit report to make sure no one has opened new accounts in your name.

Beware of e-mail scams. Whenever a major retailer reports a major hack, scammers come out of the woodwork, sending bogus emails to victims seeking more personal information.

Winter Safety Tips: Have a professional check your furnace, chimney and fireplace

The Bloomingtondale Fire Protection District and the National Fire Protection Association remind you that it's not too early to begin preparing for the heating season. Check these tips off your list and get ahead of the winter freeze.



- The furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. (A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.)
- The chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional. (Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.)
- The fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass, in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.
- A covered metal container is ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. (The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)
- Any portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off.
- Any portable space heaters will be plugged directly into an outlet (not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people.
- We have tested our smoke alarms and made sure they are working. (You need smoke alarms on every level of the home, inside each sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)
- We have tested our carbon monoxide alarms and made sure they are working. (Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.)

Protect Your Family When Seconds Count – Register for Smart911!

What is Smart911? – Smart911 is a confidential service that allows you to create a profile that is activated when you dial 9-1-1. The electronic safety profile provides essential household information about family members, home, pets, and vehicles. This information will display automatically on the 911 call taker's screen when users make an emergency call. It is private and secure, and you control what information is in your profile.

Who can use Smart911? – Anyone who lives, works, or visits DuPage County can create a profile. It is free and completely confidential – the information provided is available only to emergency responders during a 911 call. The service can be especially valuable to households with young children, senior citizens, or anyone with a physical or cognitive disability.

What information can be included? – Anything you think could be useful, including:

1. Family members' ages, photos, or physical descriptions.
2. Information about your home, including address, utility shutoff valves and key holders.
3. Medical information, such as medications, medical conditions, or disabilities.
4. Special considerations like language restrictions, restraining orders, or rescue notes.

How do you sign up? – Visit www.smart911.com to create a profile. The step-by-step online process lets you decide which information you want to include on your profile – and you can update or change your profile at any time.

Avoid Ruptured Pipes This Winter


Here are a few ways to prevent water pipes from freezing during extreme cold snaps in winter:



- Seal cracks in doors, windows and foundations. Small openings can create a concentrated blast of air that can quickly freeze pipes.
- Make sure that all rooms in the house that have plumbing fixtures are heated. Water pipes in unheated rooms can freeze, rupture, and cause extensive water damage.
- Consider installing pipe insulation around the water pipes. Local hardware stores carry the proper type of insulation for this task. Remember to check the insulation to make sure it is not wet. Wet insulation is worse than no insulation.
- Advise all family members where the main water shutoff valve is located (usually near the water meter) in case of emergency.
- Open cabinet and closet doors so that warm air can circulate around the pipes.
- Allow cold water to trickle through the faucets at the highest part of the house to prevent water from freezing in the pipes.

If pipes freeze, NEVER thaw frozen pipes with an open flame. This is a fire hazard.

- Use hot air from a hair dryer, the exhaust from a vacuum cleaner, heat lamps, heat tape, or electric heaters to thaw a frozen pipe.
- Consider using the heat from a light bulb to thaw pipes slowly. Be sure to keep the bulb away from combustible material to avoid starting a fire.
