A Message from Mayor Franco

Well, now that it is the month of June, I'm going out on a limb to say "Happy Summer! Let's hope it's here to stay!"

I have some exciting news about Old Town, but first I need to voice my disappointment about one of the April election results. Michael Hovde, Jr. has been one of our trustees since 2011. He grew up here, lives here with his own family and is a very active member of the community. Michael ran for the Bloomingdale Township Supervisor position and won. I told him (repeatedly!) I would not accept his resignation, but apparently, the word of the voting public trumps the word of the Mayor!



I wish Michael the best. He was already on the Board when I was elected in 2013. He has been an outstanding Trustee and I have valued his counsel as Mayor. He has also been an excellent liaison to the Plan Commission over the past four years providing direction, and always supporting development in the Village. The Village's loss is the Township's gain. I know Michael will give the same level of commitment to the township as he always has to the Village.

Old Town – I am very excited about the two new restaurant additions we have attracted to Old Town. They will both be in the process of construction, most of which will be inside, this summer and fall. At the north end of Third Street in the former Fireplace Shop, Katie and Krys Wolf are transforming the building (the original smaller structure dates back to 1858) into Wolfden Brewery. The couple has been brewing beer in their basement and had been ready to take that next step. Happily they fell in love with our Old Town and could envision their brewery here. The brewery will house brewing equipment, as well as a tasting room overlooking the production room. As is typical of this kind of business, there will be some options for food, such as patrons ordering food delivery from local restaurants, bringing food in themselves or using food trucks. We're hoping to see a late 2017 opening here.

At Third Street and the piazza, Alcentro Trattoria will be a relaxed dining spot with a warm vibe for family and friends to gather and share good food and drink. Featuring a wood burning pizza oven, the menu showcases an extensive list of thin-crust pizzas, highlights specialties from the region of Abruzzo and the island of Sardinia, and boasts both modern and classic Italian fare. A full service bar will offer specialty cocktails and include a wine list showcasing wines from each region of Italy. Alcentro focuses on the motto "chi mangia bene vive bene," which means "who eats well, lives well." For what is life without delicious food and friends and family to share it with?

Alcentro Trattoria will be undergoing construction this summer. I will keep you posted on the grand opening!

The Village of Bloomingtondale experiences significant benefits as a result of our proximity to O'Hare Airport, which is an economic engine for not only our community, but the entire region.

Due to our location the Village continues to attract and retain great businesses, which help keep taxes low and services exceptional. The Village works very hard to create a Beyond Business Friendly environment that distinguishes our community as the place to be for business, but we also understand that our proximity to major transportation such as O'Hare Airport is a huge driver of our success.

We want O'Hare to continue to operate as one of the world's busiest airports to help fuel our success. However, we also believe that there are opportunities to help make O'Hare Airport a better neighbor to its surrounding communities without unduly impacting the efficiency and success of airport operations. Toward that end, Bloomingtondale continues to advocate for Good Neighbor policies at O'Hare Airport.

The overnight Fly Quiet Runway Rotation Plan is one such Good Neighbor policy, which has resulted in significant noise reduction benefits for the entire region. Bloomingtondale believes, that just as the communities surrounding the airport all benefit financially from O'Hare, they should all experience some noise impact from the airport. No single community should bear the burden of all of the noise impact from O'Hare.

The first Runway Rotation Test, which ran from July - December, 2016, received generally positive feedback. While the rotation was not perfect, it did help distribute noise across communities and create some much-needed relief for those living near the airport. Once the test was complete, we did not want to go back to the previous status quo, but to build upon this success. Bloomingtondale along with other O'Hare Noise Compatibility Commission (ONCC) members worked with the Suburban O'Hare Commission (SOC) who hired experts to analyze the results of the initial rotation test and advocate for improvements to better meet the goals of a predictable and fair distribution of overnight aircraft noise across the region.

As a result of the cooperation of SOC communities, the ONCC and the CDA, the ONCC has now approved an updated Fly Quiet Rotation Test 2, a 12-week test, which began on Sunday, April 30. It is our hope that we can continue to improve this plan, and lay the groundwork for continued cooperation as progress toward full build-out of the O'Hare Modernization Plan continues.

Summer Branch Collection Begins July 17

The Summer Branch Collection will be performed under the direction of the Village Forestry Division beginning on Monday, July 17. This free service is only available to single family detached residences.

Branches must be out by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, July 17, but should not be placed at the curb/pavement edge more than one week earlier.

This program is limited to small property maintenance clean-up projects and not intended for collection of limbs or trunks from whole tree removals, which MUST be disposed of privately.

In the event of severe storms, the Village will provide storm damage collection of woody branches ½ inch to 6 inches in diameter.

Please contact the Forestry Division at 630-671- 5800 within 72 hours of storm for branch collection.



Free Mulch Available at Village's Public Works Facility

Following the three scheduled branch collections – Spring, Summer and Fall – the contractor tub grinds the branches, as well as Village wood waste, into a high quality mulch product. This mulch is used on Village properties and is available for pick up to all Village residents for home use. Mulch is currently available at the Public Works Facility, 305 Glen Ellyn Road, 7:30 a.m. - 2:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Please bring containers, a shovel and gloves, as well as proof of residency.

Warm weather is the perfect time of year for holding a garage sale to declutter and turn your “trash” into someone else’s “treasure.” Here are some safety tips to help keep your sale on the safe side.

- **Lock up the house** – Always keep your house locked and secure windows to minimize the risk of someone entering your home while you are preoccupied.
- **Never allow anyone to go inside your house** – A request to use the restroom (even for a child) may occur, but it would be best to direct them to the nearest gas station, restaurant, or shopping area. A “NO RESTROOM AVAILABLE” sign may avoid such a request. Also, a full length mirror can be posted outside for those wanting to try on clothes.
- **Keep your yard and garage clear of hazards** – This includes tripping hazards, low tree branches, unstable tables, large objects on the edge of tables, etc.
- **Don’t leave electrical appliances and tools plugged in or batteries in battery-powered tools** – People may trip over the power cords or pull the appliance down onto other things. Children (or some adults) might accidentally turn on something dangerous.
- **Always have at least two adults present during your garage sale** – Three would be better, in which one person could check on the posted signs or run errands (ex. lunch).
- **Greet everyone who walks up** – Make sure they know you have seen them.
- **Be visible** – resist the urge to go inside when there is no-one around. You may miss some customers and some of your merchandise while you are inside.
- **Position yourself at the front of your garage in view of the street** – Apart from helping to make sure your garage sale doesn’t look deserted (a bad sign to people as they slowly drive by). It is safer for you than being at the back of your garage sale where you can’t be seen from the street.
- **Watch out for people who are wearing a fanny pack** – Some serious buyers may wear a fanny pack, but someone can also pretend to be the owner and sell some of your items pocketing the cash.
- **Have one person as the designated money-person** – Having only one person designated to handle the money prevents a shopper claiming that they paid for the item with someone else
- **Keep just enough cash on hand to make change** – Put extra money inside the home.
- **Resist accepting large bills, if possible.**
- **Keep cash you have been given laying out while you make change** – This will keep con artists from trying to tell you that they gave you a larger bill than they actually did.
- **Keep larger, higher priced items near the garage.**
- **Always check what’s being bought** – If someone tries to help by totaling a number of items for you and just gives you the total, it would be a good idea to have a quick look through the items to make sure they haven’t slipped a high value item in there without including its correct price.
- **Be Vigilant** – Thieves often work in pairs or groups where one will try to distract you while the other will steal small valuable items or the cash box.

Pool Safety Facts for the Whole Family

As summer arrives, families are looking forward to spending time in the pool, whether it's in the backyard or the public pool. Recent news reports remind us how important it is to safeguard our children. Drowning is the third leading cause of accidental death of children. It can happen in seconds, in the time it takes to answer a phone.

Children under the age of six should wear a Coast Guard approved life vest anytime they are around water, even on the beach. The plastic blow up water wings that go around children's arms cannot be relied upon as a child safety device. Here are some other safety tips:



Never leave a young child alone or with a sibling. If you must step away from the pool area, take the child, or children, out of the pool and with you.

Have a poolside phone so there is no need to leave the area and know the emergency number to call.

Teach your child to swim at a young age. Should they fall in, they might be able to help themselves by staying afloat.

If you have a pool, make sure it is protected on all four sides from neighborhood kids. The fun of having a swimming pool makes it an inviting hazard.

Place door latches on the pool entrance high off the ground so children can't open them. And make sure the door to the pool has a self-closure that will automatically close and latch.

Accidents happen. Attend a First Aid and CPR class. Know what to do before it occurs.



Recreational Trail Boardwalk Replacement Projects to Begin at the End of July 2017



The Village has retained Signature Bridge, Inc. of Mentor, OH, a specialty timber bridge contractor, to design and build replacements of the existing timber boardwalks serving the Bloomingdale Golf Club/Eastgate Trail and the Lawrence Avenue Trail; a part of the North Central DuPage Regional Trail system. The boardwalks have been closed since August 2016 after structural investigation determined that they were not structurally sound, nor safe for trail users.

Pursuant to structural engineering investigations, the existing boardwalks at each respective site will be removed and replaced with new timber boardwalks constructed of timber structural components with much higher wood preservative retention values than the originally installed boardwalks. The increased preservative values are expected to provide extended service life than the original boardwalks. The new timber boardwalks will be constructed using “top-down” construction techniques. The “top-down” method is common for boardwalk construction spanning wetlands, and other environmentally sensitive areas where access to the “floor” of the crossing is restricted.

Engineering design work started in May. Materials procurement is scheduled to begin in mid-June. Construction is scheduled to begin in end-July. Completion of both boardwalks is expected by the end of December, 2017. The cost to complete the work is \$480,000.

In the interest of all trail users’ safety, the boardwalks must remain closed until the construction is completed. The Toilet is Not a Trash Can!

What Not to Flush

- Vitamins, medicines or other pharmaceuticals
- Diapers (cloth, disposable, or “flushable”)
- Facial tissue
- Baby wipes, disinfectant wipes, etc.
- Toilet bowl scrubs pads
- Napkins or paper towels
- Dental floss
- Fats, oils and greases
- Sanitary napkins, tampons, condoms or any NON-organic material
- Wash cloths, towels, rags or any cloth items
- Plastic wrappers or packaging
- Chemical or solvents
- Cigarette butts or cigar tips

The toilet is not a trash can.

Many items marketed as disposable and/or flushable do not degrade like toilet paper, and they wind up clogging pipes and tangling pumps. They can also cause messy sewer backups that can spill onto the street or even into businesses and homes.



Only flush human waste and toilet paper.

Avoid purchasing “flushable” items. Clean with a sponge or rag that you can re-use.

Compost your food waste.

Discard hazardous material such as motor oil, antifreeze, etc. properly. If it can’t be reused, recycled or composted, place it in the garbage.

Around and About Town

Morton Arboretum Garden Calendar

JUNE

- Water trees and shrubs deeply if natural rainfall is less than one inch per week.
- Water the soil and not the foliage to reduce leaf spot diseases.
- Replenish mulch under trees and shrubs to conserve moisture, reduce weeds, and control temperature fluctuations in soil.
- Prune late spring flowering shrubs and hedges now.
- Avoid pruning oaks and elms between mid-April and October. Oak wilt and Dutch elm disease are spread by sap feeding insects carrying the disease from tree to tree.
- Monitor all plants regularly for insect and disease problems.
- Pull weeds before they go to seed.
- Plant summer flowering bulbs and annuals.
- Avoid deep cultivation around shallow rooted plants by hand pulling weeds when they are small.
- Monitor container plants daily, especially those in clay pots, for watering needs.
- Pinch garden mums and asters once a month for bushier growth. Stop pinching after July 15 so plants can set flower buds.
- Remove faded blossoms from flowering annuals, perennials, and roses to encourage more blooms.



Do I Need a Building Permit?


This is the time of year when many homeowners begin planning for improvements to their home and property. Often residents are surprised to learn that many common projects require a Village building permit.



Building permits ensure that the improvement will be designed and built in accordance with the prevailing building and zoning codes. The Village maintains a record of all permits issued to a particular property. It is not uncommon for the prospective purchaser of a residential property to contact the Village to inquire if proper building permits were obtained.

Village residents planning to build or install an accessory use or structure on their property, or make improvements to their home or property, need to contact the Building and Zoning Division prior to the start of the project. Our certified/trained personnel will provide guidance on the various codes, requirements and permits involved with the construction of your desired project.

Work done without a required permit is subject to increased fees and possible fines. Once a building permit has been issued it should be clearly posted in the front window or on the entrance door of the home.

Latex Paint Recycling Available June 1-July 30

Latex Paint Recycling takes place at Woodridge Green Valley Wastewater Treatment Facility, 7900 S. Route 53, Woodridge from June 1 – July 29, 2017 Monday through Saturday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. **The site will be closed July 1 through July 4.**

Residents can drop off their usable unwanted latex paint beginning June 1, free of charge. Usable paint is paint that has not been frozen, is less than 10 years in age and has not been mixed with other products. The paint will be filtered and re-blended into a variety of colors, types, and finishes.

The recycled latex paint will be distributed to residents for free, beginning June 8 during the same hours and location. Paint is offered free of charge to any resident, business, non-profit etc. in 5-gallon containers.

Leftover unusable latex paint should be consolidated into one container and dried with cat litter, sawdust or another absorbent material (i.e. oil absorbent). Once the paint is completely dry, it can be put out with regular garbage curbside pickup. Be sure to remove the lid on the paint can, so the waste company driver can see that the paint is dry.



NO FROG– NO CLOG!

The Village Services Department offers tips to properly dispose of Fats, Rags, Oils and Grease (FROG) - Think "No FROG, No Clog."

Pouring leftover cooking grease down the drain can cause damage to both household plumbing and water resources. The following tips may help eliminate FROG from our waste water system:

- Throw bulky waste materials (disinfectant/cleaning cloths, feminine napkins/applicators, large chunks of food) into the trash
- Do not flush cat litter down the toilet
- Freeze small amounts of fats, oils and grease in a tightly sealed container, and then dispose in the trash
- Mix cooking oil with an absorbent material, such as cat litter or coffee grounds, place in a sealed container, and dispose in trash
- Scrape and wipe grease from pan with cold water before they go in the dishwasher
- Use a strainer in your sink to catch scraps
- Cover drains with a fine screen and empty in to the trash

You should never pour grease down the garbage disposal, even if you use hot water with a grease-fighting detergent. Home garbage disposals do not remove grease from the plumbing system. Additionally, hot water will cool down in pipes causing fats and grease to coagulate, which creates blockages farther down the pipeline.



Recycle Flags

Just a reminder that there is a Flag Drop Box located next to the Founders Gazebo near the corner of Bloomingdale Road and Fairfield Way. Bloomingdale VFW Post 7539 sponsored the placement of the repository to ensure flags are disposed of properly.



Rx Medication Disposal

Please dispose of expired or unused medications into the Rx Box located in the lobby of the Bloomingdale Police Department, 201 S. Bloomingdale Road. There is no charge and the dropbox is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
